1. Make sure that their costumes do not impede their ability to move or cause a tripping hazard.
2. Make sure that the children have a full field of view when wearing masks.
3. Watch for traffic when crossing the street or walking in areas where there are no side walks.
4. Do not go inside the houses of people you do not know.
5. If your children are going Trick-or-Treating without an adult, make sure they go in groups, never alone.
6. Check all candy before you allow your children to eat anything. Discard any candy or items that are open or otherwise appear to have been tampered with.

Trick-or-Treat in Ashville is on Sunday, October 30 from 4:00 pm to 5:30 pm this year. Let's make it safe and fun.

- A meeting place for everyone once they get out.


