The veterinarian is Pam Jones, DVM. Dr. Jones is a 1993 graduate from the Ohio State University College of Veterinary Medicine. She practiced in Waynesville, Proctorville, Chillicothe and Flatwoods, KY, before purchasing the Kingston Veterinary Hospital.

The practice is limited to small animals, (dogs, cats and pocket pets). They will be accepting appointments for routine yearly vaccinations, medical, surgical

and dental procedures. They are affiliated with the Kingston Veterinary Hospital which is a full service animal hospital.

Her commitment to animals is evident by having two horses, three cats and three dogs. One of her dogs, Ruby, was a stray that ran out in front of her car one night. Unable to locate the owner, Dr. Jones has made Ruby a part of her family and now they are inseparable. For
