


### Pickaway County Area 2014 Calendar

### Trick-or-Treat Safety Tips

When taking your children out this Halloween for Trick-or-Treat, remember a few things that can help to keep them safe.

1. Make sure that their costumes do not impede their ability to move or cause a tripping hazard.
2. Make sure that the children have a full field of view when wearing masks.
3. Hem your costumes so you don't trip and fall.
4. Apply reflective tape to your Halloween costumes.
5. Avoid cumbersome masks. Use makeup instead.
6. Use only hypoallergenic and non-toxic makeup.
7. Wear comfortable, practical shoes.

8. Double tie your shoelaces so you don't trip.
9. Watch for traffic when crossing the street or walking in areas where there are no side walks.
10. Do not go inside the houses of people you do not know.
11. If your children are going Trick-or-Treating without an adult, make sure they go in groups, never alone.
12. Check all candy before you allow your children to eat anything. Discard any candy or items that are open or otherwise appear to have been tampered with.
