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Water Resource Recovery Facility Project Update



Part B of this project has been awarded to Fields Excavating, Inc. The facility, Part A, continues being constructed by Peterson Construction Company. Part B involves the installation of the infrastructure to connect the new facility to a pumping station at the current location and an effluent line from the new facility. That route will include Scioto Street, north up to Rich Street, west to Lexington and north to the new facility. At Rich another line will run up Rodgers Alley which is the alley between Lexington and Scioto Street. Construction will begin on the south side in January.

Intersection St.Rt. 752 & Long Street Project Update



Decker Construction will continue working on the project (temporary striping of lanes, including a center left turn lane, and the traffic signal). The goal is have this intersection operational in the first two weeks of January. They will stop work and resume the project in late March and early April to complete four items:

- Final Road Overlay
- Concrete Sidewalks
- Landscaping
- Final Lane Painting.
