Let me know if you need anything else.

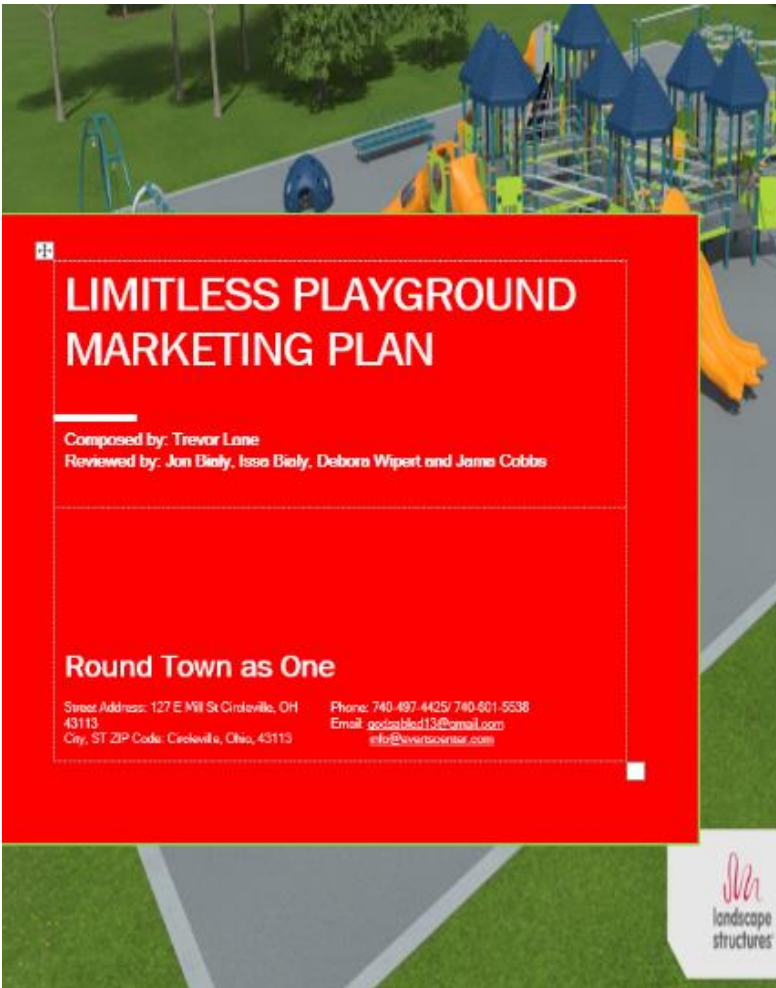

1. Executive Summary

The “Limitless” playground is a 12,500 square foot structure with location pending. This playground will offer a unique opportunity for children with and without disabilities to participate in all-inclusive play where every piece of equipment is wheelchair accessible. The land will also be developed with sensory needs and those with visual impairments in mind. We will also make sure that service animals are accommodated as well. In addition, a bike path will also be implemented so that every member of the family, especially senior adults can actively benefit from the playground as well. Currently, the cost of the project stands at \$1 million.

2. The Mission and Vision

Mission statement: The mission of the “Limitless” playground is to create an environment where people of all ages and abilities can thrive.

Vision statement: To see people of all ages and abilities come together as one by way of all-inclusive play.

3. The Problem We’re Seeking to Solve

Pickaway County and the surrounding areas has prided itself on the level of care we seek to provide individuals affected by disability in our community. I (Trevor Lane) can personally attest to the fact that we do indeed have some of the most passionate and compassionate people advocating for people with disabilities in our community. However, we should not be satisfied with where we are. There is always room for improvement.

As a child growing up with a disability (Cerebral Palsy), I can remember spending a lot of time at the old Brook Yates Center playground which was located on what is now the Pickaway County Board of Developmental Disabilities office building. I was blessed to have many “typical” kids as friends, but I remember needing to have an assistant on the playground because while I went to a school that was all-inclusive and integrated kids with and without disabilities together, the playground where the kids gathered to play was ironically not all-inclusive. There were many ladders that needed to be used in order to get to the main parts of the playground and I, using a walker to walk at the time needed help climbing.

At the Ashville Park will be The Viking Festival on April 30th and May 1st. It starts at 10 A.M. and the admission price is a canned food donation. The festival is a celebration of Scandinavian and World History. Viking re-enactors from all over the country will be in attendance. A 40 foot Viking Longship is scheduled to be at the event. The Festival is focused on the history and lifestyle of the Vikings. The primary time being depicted will be 10th century Vikings. For educational purposes, other time periods may be represented. The Viking re-enactors will be joined by Ancient Romans, 10th Century Irish, and 10th Century German Landsknechts. Jousting from Combatant's Keep will be jousting twice a day. Also returning in 2011 are Camel Rides. The Festival has continuous entertainment on 3 stages throughout the day. Two food venues provide reasonably priced meals for the whole family. The following events are scheduled: Shields and Viking Unit Fighting Classes, Die Nachtjäger, German mercenary group known as Landsknecht, from 1480 to 1560 will be encamped, and teach Fighting with a Pike. Live Steel Fighting with the public invited to watch and a Kubb Tournament. A new group for entertainment will be Kilrush which is a Celtic fusion group performing Saturday evening.
