Due to House Bill 5 by the Ohio Senate your estimated 2018 fourth quarter taxes are due on December 15th.

On other quarters they are due:

- ⇒ First Quarter-April 15th
- \Rightarrow Second Quarter-June 15th
- \Rightarrow Third Quarter-September 15th

Seasonal Advice from the Village of Ashville Service & Police Department

While the weather has been mild, we are preparing the village for winter. The goal of the service department is to maintain the safe flow of traffic. The crews work around the clock as needed for snow plowing and salt application. The snowplows will clean the streets from curb to curb. You can help the service department during sleet, hail, ice, and snow removal. This can only be done if cars are not parked along the curb. Please remove car (s) to an area that has been plowed. They can be returned once plowed.

Main and secondary roads are given first priority for plowing and salting to assure emergency accessibility and to ease trafcongestion. Residential streets are plowed afterwards.

- Primary Streets Long, Station, Long, Station, Circle Ave., & State Route 752 Circleville
- Secondary Streets = Jefferson, Miller, Scioto, Cromley, East, Powell, Randolph, Walnut, Plum and Park.

All Remaining Streets in Ashville

Snow Parking Ban - Parking is prohibited in Village Business District when snow has accumulated to a depth of two (2) inches. Signs are posted in these designated

Property owners are responsible for snow and ice removal from sidewalks in front of their property. Depositing of snow or ice onto any public street or sidewalk is prohibited. Snow must be kept on the property it falls. Snow from your driveway may not be taken across the street. Also, please keep fire hydrants and storm sewer drains clear.

If you need the Service Department, call 983–6367 and ask for Dave Ballard. He is our Service Dept. Superintendent and he will return your call. (We would like to call your attention to pot holes. If you happen to see them, please call 983-6367).

We thank the dedicated drivers for working long cold to make our streets safer to drive.
