The Mayor's Column-Teays Valley's Recycling Project



I am happy to report that an institution critical to the vitality of our community has taken on recycling as a responsibility and a project.

Teays Valley has five (5) eight (8) yard refuse dumpsters. These dumpsters were emptied twice per week. The week of January 29th two of these dumpsters were converted to recycling material. One is used for cardboard and the other is for the remainder of the recycling material.

The students and staff, pictured below, are undertaking this project. Jessica J. Holes, Biology & Environmental Science Teacher, is coordinating this program. Eightyfive (85) recycling bins are being delivered to classrecycle carts for the school to use to transport recyclables to the dumpsters.

Everyone will be engaged to move from refuse to recycle. Students and staff will have the opportunity to put aluminum cans, plastic, glass, and paper in bins that allows the material to be reused and not wasted in a landfill.

You may ask yourself how much more is this going to cost?

The answer is.....Teays Valley is estimated to save about \$8,000/year. Today the reality is recycling makes sense both for the environment and economically. It is costly to find and develop landfills.

I am asking you to allow your student (s) when they come home to continue what they will be taught to do at school. Take your recycle material and place it in your red recycle contain-

rooms and six (6) 65 gallon er provided by Ashville through Local Waste Services. By reducing refuse and increasing recycle material it will save money in the long term.

> Thus far we have gone from 6.52 tons/month in 2015 to 10.92 tons/month in 2017. January 18 was 17.97 tons. This is a 175.58% increase. Congratulations.

> What a great family project this could become!



Jeff George being Sworn in as Police Chief by Mayor Wise

Charles Wise, Ashville's Mayor, swears in Jeff George as the Police Chief, Monday evening, January 29th. George's parents, Mike and Judie George, were there to offer their support.

Jeff George, a 16-year veteran of the Ashville Police Department. George was hired with a unanimous vote by village council, and was sworn in immediately after by Mayor Charles Wise. Jeff George will replace Chief Douglas Clark. Wise, a childhood friend of Chief Clark, called the meeting, "a very important night." "I'm proud of you and I think you'll do a good job," Wise said to George. "Jeff's been doing the job since we lost Mr. Clark, which was a

pretty big hit on all of us personally and professionally. It's been hard for me to move forward but Jeff's been doing a good job and I look forward to working with him for years to come. "The council chambers were filled with fellow Ashville Police Officers, Pickaway County Sheriff Robert Radcliff and members of the Harrison Township Fire Department, along with George's family.

George said it meant a lot to have such a show of support from everyone. "I didn't really expect that many people," he said. "It makes you realize you do impact the people in your life that you don't know about. I appreciate it a ton." Radcliff said the Sheriff's Office is going to be there whenever George or the Ashville Police Department needs them. "I've talked to Jeff multiple times since Doug's passing," Radcliff said. "We're here to assist him in any way we can, just as if Doug was still here. I've assured him he always has our support. I think he'll do a fine job for the citizens of Ashville. I personally think council made the best choice. "Radcliff noted that Clark would have chosen George for the job if presented with the choice. "We're very proud of him and we know he was Chief Clark's right hand man," Radcliff said. "When he became ill [Clark] asked council if they wanted to have Jeff promoted to be the next-in-command in his absence. I know the confidence that Chief Clark had in him. I know he's looking down on Jeff and know they picked the right guy for the job. "George said he learned a lot from Clark and will use that knowledge as he starts his duties as police chief. "It's going to be some big shoes to fill," George said. "I've been here 16 years and I've had former chiefs that have taught me a lot. I'm going to take a little bit from each one of them and hopefully do the best I can and do the village right. "George said he wants to make the department more proactive while preserving the atmosphere. I want to continue the small town community feel that the town really likes and deserves," he said. George said he's looking to also continue to partner with other area agencies. "As a detective I worked with the Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force and worked hand-in-hand with the detectives on things like the murder case we had," he said. "We've worked very closely with them for a number of years now. I think it will continue and be even closer now. "Radcliff agreed, noting he felt he had to be present at the swearing in to support George. "He's been a great partner and our partnership is going to continue," Radcliff said.
