On August 18th the Wright-Poling Pickaway County Dog Shelter is teaming up with shelters across the country for the fourth annual "Clear the Shelters" animal adoption drive.

Since 2015. "Clear the Shelters" has helped 153,651 pets find forever homes. The Pickaway County Dog Shelter will try to find homes for 85 dogs current at the shelter.

Every year, millions of companion animals end up in shelters across the country. While shelter adoption rates have been steadily rising since 2011, according to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, approximately 1.5 million animals - 860,000 cats and about 670,000 dogs - are still euthanized each year due to overcrowding. While we are fortunate to have a shelter that euthanizes for only health and aggression issues, it creates an obligation to get them out of the shelter to a home.

What Kind of Dog Best Fits Your Lifestyle?

The number of dogs in our shelter and shelters nationwide could be reduced dramatically if more people adopted pets instead of buying them. By adopting a shelter animal, you actually save two lives. Every single pet that is adopted frees shelter staff up to work with and prepare the next pet for potential adoption. Last year, more than 80,000 pets were adopted from over 900 shelters across the country.
