The Mayor's Column-Recycling a Success Story

The February 2018 Newsletter announced that the Teays Valley High School had launched a recycling project.

It was a joint project of students and staff. Jessica J. Holes, Biology & Environmental Science Teacher, coordinated this program. With Eighty-five (85) recycling bins and six (6) 65 gallon recycle carts they have been recycling for the last year.

Everyone was engaged to move from refuse to recycle. Students and staff had the opportunity to put aluminum cans, plastic, glass, and paper in bins that allows the material to be reused and not wasted in a landfill.

There is also a shift in the economic impact of recycling. For example, Teays Valley was estimated to save about \$8,000 / year. Today, the reality is, recycling makes sense both for the environment and

Village of Ashville Foundation and Park Advisory Commission

The January 2019 Issue of the Ashville Newsletter discussed the formation of a Village of Ashville Foundation. The Village Government will serve as a catalyst to get this organization underway. Ashville will des-



ignate \$10,000 seed money with the Pickaway County Community Foundation. That connection will allow it to be a 501(c)(3) organization with reduced administrative cost through an existing foundation. The objective of this organization will be to raise philanthropic funds for projects that benefit the community.



Another committee is being formed. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission will be an voice to provide guidance to the Village Council and the Park Committee on areas involving current and future initiatives. The

mission of this Advisory Commission is to advise the Village Council on the best ways to create, sustain and preserve excellent parks, trails, and open spaces in order to enrich lives of Ashville residents and visitors by providing high quality recreation and education opportunities in harmony with natural resource preservation and stewardship.
