Utility Fee Update for Consumer Price Index (CPI)

Consumer Price Index Increase for 2020 is 1.4% based upon Ordinance 2009-03 which provided for keeping revenue in alignment with expenses. The water charge will go from \$3.74 to \$3.80 and the sewer charge will go from \$7.61 to \$7.72. The following reflect the changes you should see in that bill.

This will be the first year since 2014 we have not had to increase debt service for the Water Resource Recovery Facility.



The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a market basket of consumer goods and services. Indexes are available for the U.S. and various geographic areas. Average price data for select utility, automotive fuel, and food items are also available.

WRRF Debt Service is the charge to pay the OWDA, OPWC, and DEFA loan from a set-aside fund account. It is to avoid mixing operational wastewater costs and create more Village accountability.

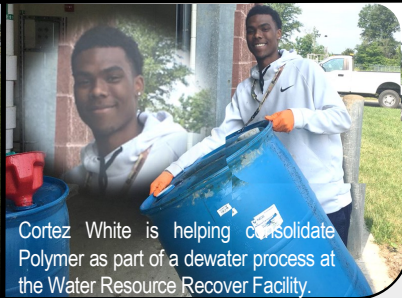


2021 Summer Student Works Program

They will first work on the westside from south to north. Once the westside is completed they will move to the eastside and follow the same protocols. Once the project has been completed the infrastructure should be able to better handle rain events.
