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
ASHVILLE VISION STATEMENT

State Route 316 Long & W. Main Street Project Update

This is a stormwater, sidewalk, curbs, paving and landscaping project. All but paving has been completed on West Main Street. We anticipate ODOT to move to complete paving before fall.

Newcomer Concrete started work on Long Street sidewalks. They were working on the westside from south to north. Once the westside is completed they will move to the eastside. Once the project has been completed the infrastructure should be able to
